Good Shepherd International School organized a two-day orientation programme in its Palada Campus on 18th and 19th of July 2017 for the benefit of the new and existing academic and co-curricular teachers working in both the campuses. This programme was organized before the start of the new academic session to enhance innovative teaching techniques, share and gain knowledge and make the teaching and learning process more relevant and related to day-to-day situations.

The new academic year 2017-2018 began with freshness and fervour as all the listeners (the teachers) proved to be active and excited to begin the year well, improving their approaches to teaching and learning, eager to bring out the best from the students. The tone for this was set when Vice Principal (Academics), **Mrs Sheila Alexander** spoke about the *Three E's - To Educate, To Equip and To Empower* - necessary to bring out the leader in every child entrusted to our care. Besides using the acronym of ASPIRE (Aspiration and Achievement, Self-Awareness, Professionalism, Integrity, Respect and Endeavour), she emphasized the need to change from Data-driven decision making to Decision-driven data analysis. She provided a lot of resources to enable the improvement of our school, particularly *Mind Their Hearts* by David Boddy. Earlier, the new members of staff who joined the school in this session came forward and introduced themselves to the group during the assembly.

The next session was conducted by the Vice Principal (Administration), **Brigadier Suresh Kumar VSM (retd)**, who presented a three-pronged session: the History of GSIS, the Facilities of GSIS and the Future of GSIS. The presentation of the Curriculum and Professional Development Coordinator, **Mr T Suresh**, was focused on *Learning How to Learn*. The highlight of his presentation was the identification of *Focused Thinking* and *Diffuse Thinking* and the means to arrive at these two Modes of Thinking.

The Director of Counselling, **Mrs Anila Kalyan**, brought to light a novel word and its implications, that is, IKIGAI, a Japanese concept meaning 'a reason for being.' She posed four questions enabling self-reflection and thus, pointed out the need for prioritizing. The Orientation Programme for the day ended with the Section and Department Meetings to which all the teachers took forward the spirit to bring out the best to be the best.

The next day, **Ms Christine Maurice** talked to the teachers about *Inclusive Education* and the importance of including students with diverse needs in the classroom providing opportunities for them to learn and accept individual differences. **Mr Ajith P Jacob**, Director of Activities, elaborated on *The Millennium Onward*. **Mr Mathew Lawrence**, a teacher facilitating the study of Spanish at GSIS, took a session on 'Student Engagement.' A meeting of the teachers handling the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP) was also held. This was followed by collaborative faculty meetings. The programme ended with an open forum during which the management addressed the queries raised by the teachers.

From 15th to 17th July 2017, the IB Asia-Pacific In-school Workshop on Diploma Programme Approaches to Teaching and Learning (ATL) took place in the auditorium of Good Shepherd International School. The workshop leaders were **Ms Naaz Kirmani** and **Mr Mohammed Zawid Naseem**, two scholarly people who hold leadership positions in their respective schools and are highly experienced in the world of IB accreditation and evaluation and workshop leading.

The workshop comprised ten sessions spread across three days. The workshop started with setting expectations for the workshop after an ice-breaking session. Right from the ice-breaking session till the final session on workshop leaders and Inquiry Questions, the workshop leaders modelled the Best Practices of effective Teaching and Learning practices and kept the participants engaged through activities. All the eleven Teaching and Learning skills identified by the IB were modelled by the workshop leaders when they were enabling the participants to explore all of them.

The various presentations that followed took the leaders by surprise as all the groups had chosen different topics and a great deal of study had been undertaken by all the members. Many assumptions were proved false and the entire exercise was an eye-opener for all.

The workshop ended with appreciation by both the school management and the workshop leaders who had a lot of praise for the school, the hospitality, the management and the nature of participation in the workshop. All the participants were geared up to put into practice whatever they had learnt and bring out the best from the students.

Space is a continuous area of vast expanse which is free, available and unoccupied. And on Earth we are not left with free space any more. NASA Space Camp is the closest you can get to seeing yourself on an expedition to Mars in the near future.

It has been 52 years since National Aeronautical and Space Administration (NASA) did something as significant as having a man, or woman, walk in space. Launched in 1982, the Space Camp inspires and motivates young people to experience space and simulate a mission to Mars, train like an astronaut, build rockets, go underwater, train like a fighter pilot and hone land and water survival skills, build, design and compete in a week for air, water and land robotics, and learn about space history.

Of all the planets of the solar system, Earth and Mars, the third and fourth planets of the Solar System are very similar to each other. Despite the similarities, Mars is essentially like no other planet. It has water and organic molecules.

With the Russians putting the Sputnik and the humans in space and outcompeting the United States as far as space technology went, a civilian space agency was formed in 1958 called NASA.
