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Founder-Principal of GSIS Dr P C Thomas left for his heavenly abode

We express our profound grief over the sad demise of the eminent educationist and visionary, **Dr P C Thomas**, our beloved Founder-Principal of Good Shepherd International School, Ootacamund, on Tuesday, 16th of June 2020. He was 76. His funeral was held at the chapel of Good Shepherd International School in the Palada Campus on Friday, 19 June 2020.

Dr Thomas was born on 15 October 1943 in Ettumanoor, a major town and municipality in the Kottayam district of Kerala. He studied at St. Thomas College, Palai, for his degree in Botany and St. Joseph's College, Devagiri in Kozhikode for his post-graduate degree in English Literature. Later, he obtained his doctorate degree in education management from Columbia Pacific University, USA.

Dr Thomas had worked as a teacher at the Loyola School in Thiruvananthapuram and Sainik School at Bijapur. He later served as the Principal of the Cordite Factory School at Aruvankadu, and the Breeks Memorial School in Ooty. He then founded the Good Shepherd Public School in 1977 and since then it has grown into a world-renowned International School. The school is currently one of the most prominent schools in Asia. Spread over an area of about 160 acres, the school is fortunate to have state-of-the-art facilities and infrastructure that provide a wonderful teaching-learning environment. Good Shepherd International School has been an IB World School since

February 2002. The school was re-accredited by Council of International Schools (CIS) on 27 March 2019 and to the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC) on 2 May 2019. According to EducationWorld India School Rankings (EWISR) for 2019-2020, Good Shepherd International School is ranked the No.1 International Residential

School in Tamil Nadu and the **No. 2 International Residential School in India** for the year 2019. The school was ranked the No.1 International Residential School in 2016 and the No. 2 in 2017 and 2018.

Dr Thomas, the legendary and iconic personality, a titan of dignity and an epitome of grace, touched many lives with his generosity and passion for life. He had a bright and energetic personality. Dr Thomas is a recipient of numerous Indian and international awards and accolades. He was an active member of the Rotary International and served as the Governor of District 320 and was later elected to serve as an International Director. His autobiography, 'An event called LIFE', is an account of the journey of his life, a glimpse of important events, its excitements, his beliefs and values. His Mission, Vision and Objectives are our much-cherished treasures. Backbone of several institutions, his legacy of unity and harmony, inspire us to keep his aspirations alive. He will be deeply missed by everyone he was able to meet and reach out to during his lifetime. He is always in our thoughts and actions. He will continue to remain in our hearts forever.

His legacy lives on through his wife Madam Elsamma Thomas, son Liju and daughter Julie.

Eulogy for my Dad!

This is one of my wife's favourite verses in the Bible and she has quoted it to me often in relation to the raising of our two children. Today, as I stand here remembering my father, there is no better scripture I can find. For my father, was at heart a teacher of children.

The vocation of teaching is the most noble profession in this world, and Jesus Christ was the greatest teacher we know. Both Dad and Mom began their professional lives as teachers. Dad taught English literature and Mom taught Hindi. My Dad devoted his life to imparting a well-rounded Education - one that extended beyond academic excellence. When children came to him for education, many as young as toddlers, they found a home in his school. The lessons Dad and Mom have taught the students, and Julie and I, are lessons that will stay with us for a lifetime – for you never depart from the ways of your teachers. Over the past few days we have received and read

countless messages of grief and condolence from students, teachers, parents, Rotarians and many others whose paths have crossed with my father's. In every one of those messages the story is the same. My father was first and foremost a teacher, then a leader – and the man who shepherded his flock of students and staff, many of whom bear witness to that throughout their lives. They carry those teachings from their youth. There is no greater testament to a teacher than his students following his path and taking away the lessons taught for a lifetime.

Boldness, perfection, fortitude, perseverance, discipline, courage and, above all, conviction. These are the words that come to me when I want to describe my father who has made an indelible mark on this world and on so many lives. As a young man when my father set out to accomplish his life's dreams, he was obsessed, single-minded and uncompromising in his approach to education. He strived for perfection in everything he undertook. His ambition and drive were unparalleled, eclipsed only by his determination, grit and hard work. He was truly an inspiration and motivated our youth to aspire for greatness in their own lives. And through it all, he had my mother's unrelenting and unwavering love and support. If my father was the head of the school, my mother was its backbone, for without one,

the other cannot stand. This incredible institution he created along with my mother, is a testament to his vision and their strong partnership. Growing up, Julie and I often felt that he belonged more to the school than he did to anyone or anything else in this world. He often reminded us that the school was his first child – and with good reason. They have nurtured every aspect of the school and committed their lives to furthering the cause of a world-class education. Even in his final days, he took great interest in introducing new subjects like robotics and artificial intelligence to the school's curriculum because he recognized the important role they will play in the lives of our children in this constantly evolving world. He was truly a visionary and an icon in the field of education.

As many of you know, I shared a somewhat complicated relationship with my father. But as the Bible teaches us in Hebrews 12:5-6: "And have you completely forgotten this word of encouragement that addresses you as a father addresses his son? It says, My son, do not make light of the Lord's discipline, and do not lose heart when he rebukes you, because the Lord disciplines the one he loves, and he chastens everyone he accepts as his son."

You all know my father to be a disciplinarian and a tough taskmaster. Even in my youth he held me to seemingly impossible standards that he expected me to raise myself to. Although it sometimes caused resentment and misunderstanding between us, today as a father myself, I recognize that the father only disciplines the one whom he loves. And as his flock, many of you know what I speak of. I take great comfort that on my last visit in February, we both found peace and forgiveness. When I look back at my life and relationship with him now, what remains are those precious moments we shared. I will forever remember how I held him in my arms and the warmth and love in his eyes, and the forgiveness we both felt. For in death as in life, we all want to remember only the good. Dad, you always said that no one is irreplaceable. But dad, you were one of a kind and you cannot be replaced in our hearts and in our lives. *And have you completely forgotten this word of encouragement that addresses you as a father addresses his son? 74th Independence Day Celebrated at GSIS

Indians across the world commemorated India's independence from British rule by celebrating its 74th Independence Day on 15 August 2020. Beginning in 1757, Indians suffered domination of the British colonial power for nearly 200 years. We were able to claim our country back with retaliations and uprisings against the British that eventually drove them out and forced former viceroy, Lord Mountbatten, to free India on 15 August 1947 after giving the mandate to transfer the power to Indians. On 15 August 1947, the first Prime Minister of Independent India Jawaharlal Nehru unveiled India's tricolour flag at the Red Fort in Delhi. Since its independence, India has made stellar progress in every field, including education, economy, space programmes, military modernization, science and technology, research and development.

GSIS organized a virtual Independence Day celebration and activities for students on Saturday, 15 August 2020. **Brig Suresh Kumar,VSM (Retd)**, Senior Vice Principal [Administration], hoisted the tricolour flag accompanied by a formal rendition of the national anthem. 

Principal (Academics), Mrs Sheila Alexander, mentioned about the motto of GSIS - 'TRUTH, TRUST & TRIUMPH' enlightening students about these three major concepts that are applicable in everyday life. The Senior Vice Principal [Administration], Brig Suresh Kumar, VSM (Retd), reminded the students to stay safe, try to stand on their own legs and not to bank on their parents' wealth. Master Vibhas Rikin Sekhani, a student of IBDP, 2018 – 2020 batch, described his experience of studying IB at GSIS. The Higher Secondary School & IBDP Coordinator, Mr Suresh Thangarajan, reassured the students and their parents that the school is putting all its effort to ensure a smooth navigation for online learning, especially for ISC and IB students, even though remote learning may look and may sometime feel different from faceto-face instruction or traditional classroom teaching. The programme ended with the open forum during which the students raised their queries which were answered by the members of the Academic Council.

GSIS Welcomes New Students through Virtual Orientation

In 2020, COVID-19 necessitated a switch to online learning and made campus tours and traditional orientation of new students impossible. The impact of the coronavirus pandemic prompted the management to change gears and organize a virtual orientation for the incoming new students to connect with them, make them feel at home and provide all the necessary information while remaining safe at home. The **virtual orientation** was held on Friday, 31 July 2020.

The Orientation Programme started with the school prayer read by the Director of Counselling, Mrs Anila Ann Mathew. The Senior President of GSIS, Mrs Elsamma Thomas, welcomed the new students. COVID - 19 Refresher Training held at GSIS

The outbreak of an atypical strain of pneumonia circulating in the Wuhan province of China was notified to the World Health Organization (WHO) in early January 2020. This Coronavirus disease (COVID-19) was caused by a novel coronavirus that has not been previously identified in humans. The International Health Regulations (IHR) was triggered and the world was informed of the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic. The International Health Regulations (IHR) represent an agreement between 196 countries including all WHO Member States to work together for global health security. Through IHR, countries have agreed to build their capacities to detect, assess and report public health events. The genome of the novel coronavirus was mapped in the first week of January and in the second week of January, it was publically shared. By 30 January 2020, under International Health Regulations (IHR), WHO declared its highest security alert, a public health emergency of international concern.

The events of the last few months are a tragic reminder of the insecurity and instability that diseases can cause. We are all in the middle of a global pandemic. COVID-19 pandemic has changed our

world. It has humbled us all. It has caused stress to our political, economic, cultural and social infrastructure and found us wanting. It has spread to countries all over the world.

It has pushed the limits of the health systems, leaving no country untouched. No country can fight this pandemic alone. Its existence anywhere puts lives and livelihoods at risk everywhere.

Professional development is a form of education for teachers which can enhance or better their teaching or classroom environment. Educators at GSIS are familiar with professional development sessions. The final assessment criteria will be conveyed to all the teachers after they reach a consensus.

The **Council for the Indian School Certificate Examinations [CISCE]** has announced the results of its class 10 ICSE and class 12 ISC 2020 board examinations.

Students of Good Shepherd International School have achieved excellent results in the board examinations for the academic year 2019-20. We are honoured and privileged to present a brief report of the results of the board examinations for the academic year 2019-20.

Indian Certificate of Secondary Education Examination – March 2020 [Grade 10, ICSE]

The ICSE examinations began on February 27 and was scheduled to end on March 30. The normal examination schedule was disrupted due to the panic created by the spread of the novel coronavirus. In the wake of COVID-19 pandemic, a few exams were cancelled on March 19 and rescheduled in July, but were cancelled again due to the surge in corona cases. The final results in pending subjects were determined on the basis of their performance in internal assessment, pre-board examinations and the results of board examinations papers in subjects already taken.

Our students excelled in ICSE, registering 100% pass. Of the 25 students who appeared for the examination from Good Shepherd International School in the academic year 2019 – 2020, **21 secured distinction and 4 were awarded first class.** The topper scored 96.8%. One student in Computer Applications scored a perfect 100.

ICSE Examination 2020 (Science):

Of the 17 students who appeared for the examination in the Science stream, 14 secured distinction and 3 were awarded first class. The topper from the science stream, Master Darshil Kedia, scored 96.8%. He scored centum in Computer Applications.

The Indian School Certificate (ISC) examinations began on February 5 and was scheduled to end on March 30. Students were able to write examinations in most of the subjects. The ISC board examinations in Biology, Psychology and Business Studies could not be held as the CISCE cancelled these examinations due to the COVID-19 outbreak. Later, the pending examinations that were rescheduled to be held in March were also cancelled. The scores of students in these subjects were determined by the CISCE on the basis of their performance in internal assessment, pre-board examinations and results of board examination papers in subjects already taken.

28 students from GSIS appeared for the ISC examinations. **22** students secured **distinction** and **6** were awarded **first class**. **5 students scored above 90%**. The school has once again shown its academic proficiency by a cent per cent pass.

Master Meet Dobariya topped in the Commerce stream of his batch securing A*'s in all the 9 subjects.



International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme – May 2020 [Grades 11 & 12]

A total of **82** students of GSIS had registered for the IB examination for the May 2020 session. 79 candidates appeared for the IBDP and 3 candidates appeared for the IB Diploma Course. The May 2020 examinations for the Diploma Programme were scheduled to take place between 30 April and 22 May. The normal examination schedule was disrupted due to the panic created by the spread of the novel coronavirus. The IB cancelled the examinations due to the COVID-19 pandemic the world over and the difficult circumstances our students and educators are experiencing.

The IB declared the results for the class 12 students. Depending on what they registered for, the students were awarded a Diploma or a Course Certificate which reflected their standard of work. This was based on student's coursework, predicted grade as submitted to IB by respective schools and the established assessment expertise, rigour and quality control already built into the programme. The Good Shepherd International School produced very good results. 9 students scored 40 points and above in the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme of the May 2020 session. Master Sriniketh Krishnan scored 43 points out of 45 points in the IBDP examinations 2020 and attained the pride of being the school topper.
